ACADEMIC STUDY

Our Independent Study Centre is a highly purposeful positive learning environment set up to support our students in their academic studies. Fully equipped with ICT and a dedicated Study Centre Manager the area is highly valued by our Sixth Form students as a environment that allows them to thrive. These sessions are timetabled for students alongside their subject allocations, meaning that they are given the correct amount of study time for their subjects to manage their workload and succeed.

With the exception of coursework based subjects where your study will involve spending all your time on your coursework task, you will be set additional work outside of your lessons by your subject teachers.

Independent Study is your opportunity to further your understanding of the content from your academic studies. This could be in the form of individual research out of a textbook, websites or specific set tasks. Independent study should be completed in the study centre unless an arrangement has been made with your subject teacher or a member of the Sixth Form Team.





Attendance

All sixth form students are electronically registered for all lessons and any absences are identified for tutors in a report; they will discuss your attendance and log the outcome of that discussion.

Students are provided with an electronic ID card like staff which enables them to swipe in and off site where aplicable. Please swipe in with your ID card the moment you are on school site, and the moment you leave. In order to keep you safe it is important we know if you are on the site or not. Please do remember to swipe when leaving and arriving from flexi frees.

If you are absent for any reason your parent or guardian should ring the Study Centre Manager Mrs Curchin on each day of your absence.



The Sixth Form Day

The Sixth Form day runs from 8.25am until 3.40pm.

Our Tutor Time: 8.25am until 8.55am . All students are allocated to a tutor group and are expected to be on site at 8.25am.

Students will have a mix of subject taught lessons, Independent study and Free periods throughout the week. These are allocated onto a students timetable at the start of the year.

An Independent Study Session is a registered session in the Study Centre and will take place in silent purposeful working conditions.

During free periods students may leave site for various reasons in this free period. Where possible, planned medical appointments should be attended in these times. We require proof for all Medical appointments taken outside of a free for these to be authorised.

Students may have a period 6 lesson where it will finish at 3.40pm. These will not be daily but should be taken into consideration when planning bus routes.



TRANSPORT

We know that this is an exciting time in your life and many of you will be learning to drive before the end of the year.

Please do not book driving lessons or tests during the school day unless it is in your designated Free periods. You must also not book driving lessons during a period 6 lesson.

Parking:

Students driving to school (car, motorbike, etc.) and using the school car park will need to send proof of insurance documents. to the Sixth Form team. This is to keep all drivers safe. Permission to park on site can be withdrawn at any time in the event of dangerous or inappropriate behaviour. Students may park on the long access section before the large school carpark. Please drive carefully.



COMMON SPACES

Common Spaces - These are available for our sixth form students to relax and eat in. It is up to you to maintain the tidiness and cleanliness of these areas. We have two common rooms situated in College Block with a kitchen and an additional sixth form space in the café for you to use.

The sixth form area of the café is available for sixth formers to use at break and lunchtime. You may also use the whole café during free periods. Common rooms can be used during your free periods as well as break and lunch. However, please do keep noise to a minimum during free periods as lessons may be taking place in the college block during this time. Please do keep the common areas clean and tidy at all times, dirty dishes etc. should be placed in the dishwasher and you should use the bins provided. Students may leave belongings in the common room but do so at your own risk.

Charity, Events and Extracurricular




Our students well-being is of greatest importance and we believe that a full and varied enrichment program is one step to reminding our students to focus on areas outside of their academic studies. Students may choose from options such as sport, craft, EPQ, Yoga or even board games as a way to unwind and learn new skills. Other options such as off-site volunteering allows students to gain work experience and develop skills required for employment.









UCAS, Careers & Further Education Advice

Although most of our students progress to university or colleges, some also go directly into apprenticeships or employment. Our careers service provides invaluable support. Appointments may be made for personalised advice and students will also be provided with external links to independent sources of information.

We take the apprenticeship and university application process very seriously. A full programme of advice and guidance is arranged to inform and support students through their two years with us. This enables them to complete successful applications to apprenticeships, universities and colleges. In Year 12, students meet with Careers Lead, Miss Giles and/ or Deputy Head of Sixth Form Mrs Raisbeck to assist with post 18 choices and career progression, and all students have access to the online programme, UniFrog. UniFrog's sophisticated search engine brings up more relevant apprenticeship vacancies and university courses than any other website. Unifrog brings together data which is otherwise dispersed all over the web. It uses Labour Market Information from BIS and the Cabinet Office. Education data comes from NAS, DfE, Ofsted, UCAS, Unistats, HEFCE, HESA and The Guardian.

Students are expected to visit the career library to browse among the hundreds of prospectuses sent by the Higher Education institutions and apply for university summer schools, where you get to experience first-hand what it is like to be a student. There is also a special 'Higher Education Information Evening' for parents shortly after the Easter break. This fits alongside a trip to Bournemouth University to attend the UCAS Convention where you get to talk to people from universities and colleges from all over the UK. In the summer term, there are also special workshops specifically devoted to the skills required for completing the vital application forms for a degree course and guiding students on personal statements. Throughout the PSHE programme we also have a range of external speakers providing talks on a variety of topics from student finance to taking a gap year.

In the summer term, there are also special 'Progression and Enterprise Day' specifically devoted to the skills required for completing the vital UCAS application form and guiding students on personal statements. Students wanting a route into employment will have workshops to ensure they are work ready.

Young people have never had as many choices as they do now, which is why students are invited to visit the Careers Office to browse among the hundreds of prospectuses sent by Higher Education Institutions, careers guidance books and apprenticeship information. Students are encouraged to apply for university summer schools, where you get to experience first-hand what it is like to be a student.
